As a reminder, we have decided temporarily to postpone further meetings of the Nellie Hudson Sunday School Class until the current rise in COVID-19 cases abates. We will keep the members of our congregation and of that class informed of further developments.

Finally, allow me to repeat yet again the Session's concerns about safety as we resume in-person gatherings at the church:

- The Session continues to stress that individuals whose health may be compromised, and who are thus especially vulnerable to the coronavirus, should continue to worship with us from their homes. Our advice is, "When in doubt, don't go out!" You will be remembered in our hearts and prayers as we worship in the Sanctuary in spirit with you.
- While inside the church, everyone will be required to observe the Worship Committee's Health Protocols. Since a complete list of those protocols has been published already in several previous editions of this Newsletter, there is no need to print them again. A full copy of the Health Protocols is available, however, on our website in an electronic format and by the Sanctuary entrances in a printed format. If you have not already done so, please read them carefully and plan to follow them to keep you and all church members and visitors safe. We will also have greeters at the entrances to the church to help you remember all of the precautions we have in place.

As always, please continue to pray for the safety of our congregation, our community and, indeed, all of God's children as the coronavirus continues to spread illness and death.



VANDALISM AT THE CHURCH

It saddens me to report that two of the church's stained glass windows (one under the North breezeway and one under the South breezeway) were smashed on Tuesday night in a senseless act of vandalism. The police were called at the time of the crime (approximately midnight on Tuesday, November 3), and we believe they have a suspect in mind.

This morning, I was able to contact the stained-glass artisan who repaired our windows post-Harvey, and, as God would have it, he was in Victoria working on a project for another church. He interrupted his work, came right over to our property, and assured me that he would be able to seal the damaged windows against moisture and contamination from the outside air before he returned home this evening. Let us thank God for the fast response of this caring craftsman (Mr. Tim Daily of Victoria Stained Glass Studio Inc.), and let us also not forget to pray for the troubled soul (likely a homeless vagrant in the area) who, in anger, desperation, or for whatever reason, did this dreadful deed.

Naturally, a claim is being filed with our insurance carrier, and the Buildings and Grounds Committee will monitor that process as well as the repair of the broken window. We are early in the process, so we have no idea yet of how much the repairs will cost or how long they will take. We can once again, however, be grateful to God that the damage was not more extensive and that our windows can be

repaired. Subject to our deductible, we have insurance to cover the repairs, and happily, we know the craftsmen best qualified to complete them.
